Sovereign Rule and the Still-Birth of Republican Freedom: A Preface to Consociational Republicanism

Most modern political theorists fail to grasp the intimate dependence of human freedom on the complex organization and culture of a wide range of intersecting, parallel, and nested social groups. It is this theoretical blindspot, I argue, driven by a reductively individualist social ontology, that leads a wide range of modern political thinkers, including neo-Roman republicans, classical liberals, and welfare liberals, to view the State, rather than social groups, as the primary guarantor of social order and freedom. Once we reject this individualistic approach, we can more adequately investigate what sort of institutional and cultural conditions are likely to support citizens’ access to opportunities for rational self-government and personal and group flourishing. This is precisely the task I set myself in this book, starting out from a positive conception of freedom as the capacity for rational self-direction in the service of personal and communal flourishing.
